Study Abroad Canada Language Institute – The Story



"Build it, and they will come." That's all Helen Green thought she had to do when she opened her home stay and language program on PEI in 1994, based in North Tryon. She hoped to attract Japanese students, because of their fascination with Anne of Green Gables. She knew about that firsthand, having taught English in Japan and experienced a homestay there herself. She says that she thought, "Everybody wants to come to PEI, it'll just bloom."

But it didn't. That first year she had just four students.

"I had no idea of the amount of work that it would take. I was the driver, I was the teacher, the advertiser, the marketer."

To find more students, she contacted people in PEI who had worked in Japan. She spoke to the experts at Tourism PEI. She talked to former students and friends in Japan. "Nothing happened. Registrations weren't coming in," she says. She had just nine students the second year.

Then someone told her to contact the Canadian Embassy in Tokyo, and that was where she received her real training in marketing ESL. She went to an education fair in Tokyo, armed with posters, shells and sand from PEI. There were 60 institutions there, including the universities of British Columbia and Toronto. Stiff competition.

After the fair, Helen sat down with a woman from the Canadian embassy, who filled her in on how the system works in Japan. Students find schools abroad through agents, like travel agents. Instead of shopping for a vacation, they're shopping for an education. The woman gave Helen a list of all the agents in Tokyo. She remained there for three weeks, armed now with an Excel sheet and a determination to sell what she then called Helen's Home Stay and English School.

She captured the agents' interest, and the students began to trickle in. More agents heard of her and more students began to apply.

Helen next joined forces with a couple providing a similar learning experience in the old schoolhouse at Park Corner. Together, they became Study Abroad Canada Language Institute. From Tryon and Park Corner, they moved into Charlottetown, because rural PEI was too much of a shock to students coming from Japanese cities of millions of people.

It's always a challenge to attract international students to PEI, because it's more difficult and expensive to get to than other places they might go. But as so often happens, the island itself sells them on SACLI, and Helen sells the island along with her program. Her weapons include the cleanliness and safety of Charlottetown, the beauty of the island, the warmth of its people, and the experience of the homestay.

SACLI gives its students a cultural experience, too. Last year it sponsored and took students to the Montgomery Theatre's play *Pygmalion*, which dramatizes the fine points of English pronunciation. This year the institute will sponsor *An Inspector Calls*.

SACLI now has 19 full-time teachers, 6 administrators and up to 300 students in programs of varying lengths. The students come from China, Korea, Mexico and South America, as well as Japan.

Helen Green built it, and they have come.
